Uses

Goat milk can be pasteurized and sold as fluid milk, condensed, dried or made into cheese.

Where can I find goat milk?

Grocery stores and **specialty shops** offer gourmet cheese and ice creams made of goat milk, as well as body care products such as soaps and lotions.

The benefits of goat milk?

Goat milk has **fats** and **proteins** that are **easier to digest** than cow milk. Therefore, goat milk can be **better for infants** who have weaker stomachs.

Goat milk can also replace cow milk in the diets of people who are **allergic to cow milk**.

Meat Goats

Goat meat is an important source of **protein worldwide**. Goats are inexpensive to maintain, and goat meat is **lower in fat and calories** than chicken, beef, pork or lamb.

In many countries outside of the United States, goat meat is one of the **most popular meats**.
