

National Ag Day Changes for 2021-

Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom is encouraging students in PreK- 12th grade to participate in sharing their creativity by submitting an entry for National Ag Day. National Ag Day is celebrated nationwide on March 23, 2021, but due to COVID-19 and many possible restrictions, in-person events may not be happening as usual.

The National Ag Day organization's theme for 2021 is "Food brings everyone to the table". Entries can portray different kinds of foods the students like; show what farmers, processors, and others do to bring food from the "farm to table"; share fun facts about food; or show things they'd like to share about food. The national group also has student contests, downloadable materials, and ideas of how to celebrate National Ag Day. They can be found at agday.org.

The Wisconsin activity has a page that is designed so the images can be printed on Avery 5126 Rectangular Labels (5 1/2" H x 11" W) and two per sheet. The stickers can be used on carry-out bags, folders, pizza boxes, grocery store bags, take-home packets for students, and other uses to help promote National Ag Day, agriculture, or other activities. Entries are due postmarked March 31, 2021.

There are three grade-level groups: PreK – 3rd grade, 4th- 8th grade, and 9-12th grade. Through a random drawing, ten entries from each grade level group will receive a \$10 Culvers card. All entries will be sent Ag in the Classroom resources.

Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom 2021 Ag Day Activity
Open to all Wisconsin students in Pre-Kindergarten – 12th grade
“Food brings everyone to the table”

To celebrate National Ag Day on March 23, 2021, this activity allows students to share the different ways that farmers bring food to their tables. Entries can portray different kinds of foods the students like; show what farmers, processors, and others do to bring food from the “farm to table”; share fun facts about food; or show things they’d like to share about food.

The page is designed so the images can be printed on Avery 5126 rectangular Labels (5 1/2” x 8 x 11”) and two per sheet. The stickers can be used on carry-out bags, folders, pizza boxes, grocery store bags, take-home packets for students, and other uses to help promote National Ag Day, agriculture, or other activities. The original drawing is sent to WI AITC but we encourage students to make a copy to keep for themselves!

Recognition: There are three grade level groups:

- PreK – 3rd grades
- 4th- 8th grades
- 9-12th grades

Through a random drawing, ten entries from each grade level group will receive a \$10 Culvers card. All entries will be sent Ag in the Classroom resources.

Rules:

- Open to Wisconsin students in Pre-K– 12th grade during the 2020-2021 school year.
- Entries must be postmarked by March 31, 2021 or emailed by 11:59 PM that night. Hard copies should be sent to Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom, PO Box 5550, Madison, WI 53705.
- Nothing identifying the student can be on the two front sections. The form must be attached separately or put on the back of the entry.
- All artwork must be original, done exclusively by the student, and without any copyrighted characters or clip art. No computer-generated art.

Congratulations to our 2020-2021 Teacher Mini-Grant Recipients

Agriculture Education Station- Kirsten Konder- Luck Public Schools, Luck

Students in middle school agriculture class will research one area of Wisconsin agriculture and become well versed in the commodity. They will make a tri-fold display and give presentations to their class, and later to 4th grade students during their agriculture units. The displays will also be used during the Luck Ag on the Lawn Event in May which hosts more than 500 students. The grant will help purchase display boards for each student.

Hydroponic System- Stephanie DeVries- Cambria-Friesland Schools, Cambria

The grant will be used towards a hydroponic tower garden to use in middle-high school agriculture classes. The mobile resource can be moved from classroom to classroom in their K-12 building. The garden can help students learn about plant growth, pollination, food environment, and hydroponics. The grant will be used to help purchase the structure, mineral blend, rock wool cubes, pots and seeds.

Little Gardens with Big Hopes! – Cheri Oglesby- St. Rose of Lima, Cuba City


This Pre-K project will allow the students to make a garden in a bucket. Each child will choose the food seeds they would like to plant as they learn about how seeds germinate, grow and produce food. They will also learn about soil and compost. With the uncertainty of COVID, this project can be done at school or at home. The grant will help purchase the garden tools, watering cans, buckets, potting soil and seeds.

Pandemic Possibilities! – Kirstin Thompson- Greenfield Elementary, Baldwin

This timely interdisciplinary project will emphasize a balanced literacy approach to teaching students to be self-sufficient during a pandemic and the precious oral history and rural life skill educational opportunities that are a vanishing part of our heritage in Wisconsin. The grant will be used to purchase agricultural-based informational texts that students can use to do their research and give them background information. They will follow-up with interviews of community members.

“Virtual” Adopt-an-Animal- Amy Gerhardt- School District of Neillsville, Neillsville

The Neillsville FFA will partner with elementary classrooms for an “Adopt-an-Animal” project. They will have monthly virtual interactions with the elementary classes to help them learn about animals, what they eat, how they are cared for, health, and other topics. The high school students will be learning how to share information using technology, improving communication and speaking skills, and creating educational programming while staying within COVID-19 parameters. The grant will be used to purchase a camera tripod, carrying bag, cable and camera.

Rio Teacher Recognized for Agricultural Literacy Work

Lori Bongert, a fourth-grade teacher at Rio Elementary School in Columbia County, is this year's recipient of Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Ag in the Classroom program's Outstanding Teacher Award.

Each year the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation recognizes a teacher for his or her efforts in educating students on the importance of agriculture. Teachers of all grade levels and subject areas, with the exclusion of certified agricultural education instructors, are eligible to apply.

"Lori has been working closely with Columbia County's Ag in the Classroom Program for many years with the essay contest and using our materials," said Darlene Arneson, Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Ag in the Classroom Coordinator.

Bongert has local farmers visit her classroom and help with commodity presentations on corn, soybeans, and honey. She has hosted the Wisconsin Spudmobile, Alice in Dairyland and Master Gardeners to enhance her lessons and units. She works with agricultural businesses to furnish sweet corn, cranberries and soybeans for her students to use. She received a grant to construct a micro-garden wagon which the whole district can use to learn about raising plants.


Bongert earned her Bachelor of Science degree in education from UW-Platteville and her master's degree from National Louis University. Growing up on a hog farm near Poynette, she shares her love of agriculture and her experience as Fairest of the Fair in 2002 to develop her students' understanding of agriculture and where their food comes from. She taught first-grade in her first year at Rio and moved to fourth grade for the past eleven years.

Bongert will be Wisconsin's nominee for the National Excellence in Teaching Agriculture Award and will receive a \$500 sponsorship to attend the 2021 National Ag in the Classroom Conference in Des Moines, IA or to use for educational resources.

The 2020-2021 Wisconsin Essay Contest topic is "How have Wisconsin soybean farmers fueled Wisconsin's economy?" The topic is based off of the Book of the Year "Full of Beans- Henry Ford Grows a Car," written by Peggy Thomas. The contest is for Wisconsin fourth- and fifth-grade students and entries are due April 1, 2021.

The documents below include the teacher's handbook, volunteer handbook, lessons and activities and the contest information sheet. The list of county essay coordinators will be added once they are confirmed.

Essay submissions must be 100-to-300 words in length and will be judged on content, grammar, spelling and neatness. The contest is sponsored by Wisconsin Soybean Association, We Energies, Wisconsin Soybean Marketing Board and the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation.
